## Survey the Text - Follow these steps:

- Look at the chapter titles. What do these titles have in common? What do you notice?
- Read a few of the short epigraphs that come before each chapter begins. Do they seem to have a common thread? What do you know about them? Their authors?
- Look at the length of the book and count the chapters.
- Look for any photographs or maps what are they of?
- Identify the author and publication date.
- What other works has Krakauer written? What do you know of them?
- Read the author's note (preface)

## Making Predictions and Asking Questions

- 1. What do you know or assume about a magazine called *Outside Magazine*? Who do you think the intended readers are?
- 2. Why do you think Krakauer wrote this particular book?
- 3. What do you think made this story so popular? What do you think people found engaging about it?

## **Author's Note**

- 1. What might McCandless' motives have been for his behavior? (p. 3)
- 2. How difficult would it be to invent a new life?
- 3. In p. 4, Krakauer introduces some themes of the book. Discuss these.
- 4. In p. 5, Krakauer warns that he will not be an impartial biographer. What does he mean by this?
  - a. Are all biographers impartial? What can we expect from Krakauer?
- 5. In the last paragraph, he introduces the complexity of Chris McCandless. Keep in mind these questions as you read the book...

- Should we admire McCandless for his courage and noble ideas?
- Was he a reckless idiot?
- Was he crazy?
- Was he arrogant and/or stupid?

In your notebook/paper, write a 4-5 sentence response to Krakauer's author's note.
